Oral Health Access Among Older Californians

Oral health is a critical component of overall health. After retirement, many older adults lose their dental insurance and have lower incomes. This can reduce access to essential dental services and compromise oral health.

The population of older Californians is projected to nearly triple by 2060.



Older adults with Medi-Cal were least likely to have seen a dentist in the last year.




More older adults with Medi-Cal saw a dentist for a specific problem.




3. Income and Dental Insurance

Seven in 10 of the poorest older adults had Medi-Cal.




4. Income and Dental Care

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

- Provide affordable options for dental insurance for older adults.
